Keep in mind that we can't control what others post, so if you don't like what you read from someone on Twitter, just stop following them.

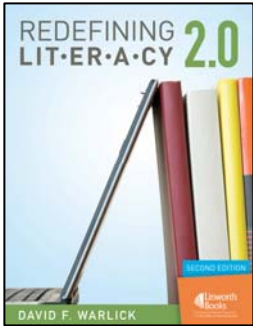
# Blogs

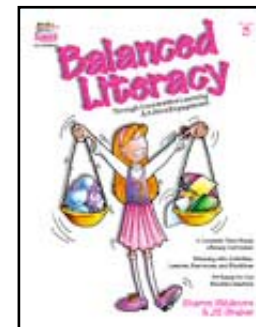
