This month we're going to talk a little bit about comprehension. Specifically we're going to talk about building background knowledge. When students can make connections to the text, it helps them to better understand what they are reading. Connections are always personal to the reader, but as educators we can ask questions that might spark their thinking.

See the chart on the right for the three types of connections – text to text, text to self, and text to world. On the pages that follow, we'll share a few books and give you some potential connections for each. By being intentional about thinking about connections, it will help readers build the background knowledge that in turn will make them better readers!

<u>Text to Self:</u> You make connections between something you've read and something from your personal life.

<u>Text to Text:</u> You make connections between what you're reading and something you've read or seen or heard such as a painting, movie, television program, or song. <u>Text to World:</u> You make connections between what you've read and the broader world. These are often bigger "Idea" connections.


