### **Hallway Greeting**



#### What is it?


Hallways greetings are a short amount of text displayed on the outside of the classroom so that all students and teachers in the building can read it. They might be quotes connected to the Lifelines or a small amount of text connected to your curriculum. Students in other classes can read about what you learning!

#### How does this enhance learning?

This is the first message people see outside your room. It helps to reinforce to your class what they are learning and communicates that message to the entire school. Small dry erase boards, posters or bulletin boards outside the room are a perfect fit to share hallway greetings.

- At the end of each day (or week), have one learning club be responsible for writing a sentence(s) to summarize something they learned this week.
- Choose a quote from one of the books read in class that week.
- Write a sentence that highlights something taught during a writing mini-lesson.
- Focus on Lifelines.

### **Procedures**



### How To Check Out a Book

- 1. Use INITIATIVE to get a shelf marker.
- Use COMMON SENSE to use your shelf marker to select your items.
- Use PRIDE to bring the items to the Check-Out Desk.
- 4. Use ORGANIZATION to:
  - 1. scan your Library Media Center Card.
  - scan the barcode on the back of each item in the upper right hand corner.
  - 3. scan the reset frame to clear your name.
- Use INTEGRITY to ask for help if the computer makes a noise.

#### What is it?


Procedures are the expectations for behavior and learning. It is important to provide clear expectations...or better yet, have students help write procedures. Make sure to incorporate Lifelines into the procedures to reinforce the desired traits with students.

### How does this enhance learning?

Procedures should be posted where students would follow them. They should be posted to remind students of appropriate behavior. They should be succinct, easy to read and to the point.

  - Learning Club Work Time
  - Arrival Procedures
  - Dismissal Procedures
  - Classroom Library Procedures

### **Life Goals and Lifelines**



#### What is it?

The Life Goals are *Treat People Right* and *Do the Right Thing*. Lifelines are the traits that will help us accomplish the Life Goals. Just as the Information Center is used to display the curriculum, it is important that the Lifelines and Life Goals are displayed and embedded into your curriculum for student character development.

### How does this enhance learning?

There are lots of places that you can incorporate the Lifelines into your classroom. It is not necessary to use them all. Focus on those used in your school and classroom.

- Incorporate the Lifelines in your procedures.
- Choose one bulletin board to display the Life Goals and Lifelines. Consider adding photos of students exhibiting the Lifelines.
- Consider small picture frames that can be displayed in the common areas of the learning clubs.
- Use the Lifelines in hallway greetings and welcome messages.

### **Welcome Message**



#### What is it?

A Welcome Message is the text that greets the students every morning as they arrive to school. It should include text for students to read and a task for them to complete. Reading the welcome message and completing the task. It should be part of the students arrival procedures. The message should "kick off" the day and connect to the curriculum/activities that are planned.

### How does this enhance learning?

Welcome Messages could be written on a chalkboard or white board, projected on a screen by an overhead or data projector, or hooked up to a wall-mounted TV. Try to keep them in a consistent place to help students know where it will be every day.

- •It could very well lead into your community circle.
- Post a photo, quote, or text passage and ask students to write a short reflection.
- Students might read the passage and have a task such as identifying nouns, adjectives, and verbs.
- Maybe the Welcome Message is a story starter that students pick up and continue.
- Look for content areas such as social studies and science to provide ideas.

### **Agenda**



#### What is it?

Agendas are helpful in guiding students and teachers through the day. They provide structure to the day so students know what to expect. Agendas can also be used as a teaching tool and incorporate content and skills based from the standards.

### How does this enhance learning?

There should be a common place that the daily agenda is posted in the room. It could be a chart, dry erase board, chalkboard, or poster. It should remain posted all day.

- Use it as part of a community circle to introduce the day or as a reflection piece at the end of the day.
- Incorporate your agenda into your curriculum. For example: when teaching nouns make sure to use them throughout your agenda.
- Create the agenda with students. Based on the previous day, what do they think will happen today?

### **Community Circle**





#### What is it?

Community Circles can be used to discuss issues in the classroom, reinforce procedures, teach Lifelines, and process curriculum.

### How does this enhance learning?

One area of the room should be cleared where students can gather in a circle. In congested rooms, have a procedure for students to help readjust furniture. In a Community Circle it is important for everyone to be able to see each other.

- Discuss a book
- Share published writing
- Reflect after a project
- Discuss problems or issues in the classroom and create solutions

### **Information Center**



#### What is it?

The Information Center is a rich learning place based on the curricular topic. The centers should include text, images, vocabulary, objects and any other artifacts that could enrich student understanding.

### How does this enhance learning?

The Information Center should be aesthetically pleasing. Bulletin boards, counter tops, etc. are all good places for building an Information Center. Students should have a critical role in creating these centers. It should be a reflection of what is being learned in your classroom.

- Consider using an ABC of it all chart with the topic in the middle and vocabulary words that support that topic in ABC order.
- Make sure that there are photos, images, and objects. This will help students connect to the text.
- Label EVERYTHING in the Information Center so that students are immersed in the text as well as the topic.
- The Information Center is more than just a display. It should be incorporated with instruction. Refer to it as you study the topic.
- Be sure to have your students actively involved in creating these centers!

### **Learning Clubs**





#### What is it?

Learning Clubs are small groups of students assigned to work together in the classroom.

Learning Clubs enable students to collaborate, build relationships and solve problems.

### How does this enhance learning?

Group students by pushing desks together or using tables. Provide clear procedures and expectations about sitting in Learning Clubs. Make supplies such as pencils, crayons, and glue easily accessible for each Learning Club.

- Consider different ways to group students
- Assign roles for each student
- •Be sure to have Learning Club procedures in place
- Change Learning Clubs as necessary
- Make sure supplies get replenished

### **Classroom Bulletin Boards / Displays**



#### What is it?

Students learn everywhere including bulletin boards. Make sure bulletin boards are focused on curricular topics. The displays should reflect diversity and appeal to all learners. You will want to save room to display your students' work.

### How does this enhance learning?

Be certain that all displays connect to your current topic.

- Students feel a sense of pride when their work is on display
- Teachers can refer to the topics as they teach
- Displays about Lifelines remind students about behavior
